A fellow disciple on the Way...

The Cross: Substitution or Participation?

"Jesus called them together and said, 'You know that those who are regarded as rulers of the Gentiles lord it over them, and

their high officials exercise authority over them. Not so with you. Instead, whoever wants to become great among you must be your servant, and whoever wants to be first must be slave of all. For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many" (Mark 10:42-45 NIV).

The above passage marks the third time that Jesus *predicts* His impending death to the disciples in Mark's Gospel (8:31-38; 9:31-37; 10:33-45). Each of the three passion predictions is followed by the disciples' *reaction* (their failure to understand or accept it fully) and Jesus' *response* (an explanation of what is involved for Jesus, for the disciples, and for all future followers). While the disciples are not being called to *physically* pass through death to resurrection alongside Jesus in Jerusalem, *metaphorically* their death-to-resurrection experience will be one of paradoxical leadership in the new community of faith. The ethos of the new Christian community will not be the same as that of the world from which they have been called. They will not act like those in authority in the Gentile world who rule as lords, kings, and tyrants. Rather, they are called to follow the servant-leadership model of Jesus Christ; they are to lead like a child, a servant, a slave.

It is probably fair to say that most contemporary Christians, especially in the Western hemisphere, primarily understand the sacrificial and salvific death of Jesus as *substitutionary atonement* for the world. The controlling metaphor for that understanding is our own experience of a responsible human judge who, no matter how loving, cannot clear the docket of all offenders by anticipatory forgiveness. According to the theological interpretation of *substitutionary atonement*, our offense is such that no amount of finite human punishment or sacrifice can atone or appease the wrath of an infinite God. God therefore sends His only divine Son as punishment for our sin. As a result of Christ's death, God's forgiveness is now freely available for all repentant sinners. While this interpretation has merit and is certainly warranted by Scripture, I wonder if this is the only and maybe the best metaphor for understanding God. What about the metaphor of God as a loving Parent, whose non-punitive forgiveness has always been and will always be accessible to the penitent? Jesus instructs us in the Lord's Prayer to call God "our Father" (Matt 6:9-15; Luke 11:2-4; cf. Gal 4:6).

In the death of Jesus, we are offered an example of how to simultaneously embrace divine forgiveness and establish a positive union with God as loving Parent. Since Jesus is the ultimate revelation of God, the Father, it is only by *participating* in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus that a saving "at-one-ment" is possible. In Mark,

Jesus persistently teaches that the Twelve and all His followers must pass with Him through death to a resurrected life. Yes, He has *substituted* for us, but we must *participate* in that transition with Him. A life that is transformed is one that accepts the *substitutionary* death of Jesus and is willing to *participate* in His life by "abiding"



Celebrate Christian Literature: Past and Future



CA Hefty Toll

I assumed that I was saving money when I booked a hotel in a little town called Saddle Brook, New Jersey, rather than in Manhattan while attending an admitted students' event at Columbia University with my son. But I was quickly reminded that sometimes we pay a heavy toll for making assumptions. In my haste, I had not counted the cost nor weighed all of my options. Every time I crossed that George Washington Bridge from New Jersey into Manhattan, I had to pay a \$13 dollar toll, not to mention the extra cost of gas, and a steep parking garage fee when I was not lucky enough to find street parking near the campus. Then there was the added stress of trying to navigate heavy nighttime rush-hour traffic with a cell phone GPS system that was registering delayed responses that caused me to miss turns and exits more than a few times. Coupled with my poor night time vision, I was a nervous wreck! Ahhh! We pay a heavy toll for making assumptions.

Now that I have recuperated, I am laughing at myself. I do that when my silly mistakes frustrate me. Sometimes though, it is no laughing matter. I have made other mistakes just because I assumed that I was in the will of God, so I did not bother to consult Him beforehand. Shamefully, I even did it concerning marriage; not once, but twice. My decision *seemed* spiritual enough both to me and to those well-meaning people within my sphere of influence, so I just went with it. But life has taught me that we pay a steep price when we make big decisions without God's direct quidance.

As a result of Solomon's prayer to God, *Give me wisdom and knowledge, (2 Chronicles 1:10)*, the Bible says, *The Lord gave Solomon wisdom, just as he had promised him. (I Kings 5:12)*. Notice that Solomon asked. first.

I know that the shortest distance between two points is a straight line. But when we are about to enter unfamiliar territory, as I did last week, it is always in our best interest to seek Godly wisdom... *first*. Otherwise, the so-called shortest distance can turn out to be a very long, stressed-filled journey filled with many frustrating loops.

In the end, the universe must have corrected itself because my trip found its own beautiful balance, despite myself. I attended a few great lectures on engineering. I met other prospective parents. I got to experience my son's excitement about the school and meeting new friends. I found a great flea market and I even got a chance to get a taste of uptown Manhattan. Somehow my mistake forgave me, but only because I surrendered to the embedded lessons.

Here is my counsel to you. When embarking upon unfamiliar territory of *any* life venture, seek God first, unless you are willing to pay a hefty toll.

"Here a missionary...there a missionary...everywhere a missionary"

"But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." (Acts 1:8)
